#### They are in middle-of-the-road situations.

- They are in school, but nationally
  - Many students are not enrolled or not attending school
  - Many students are below grade-level academically and socially
  - Many schools cannot offer minimal online/technological support
  - The socioeconomic divide in education is growing
- Recovery from covid-19 will be complicated by
  - The willingness of legislators to act now
  - Funding challenges
  - DEI-related differences in quality of K-12 educational opportunities
  - Dependence of mitigation strategies on age/grade in 2020



#### They will be in our pipeline for ≥12 more years.

- Now, layer this fact on top of
  - Declining demographics
  - Ballooning student indebtedness
  - Pre-covid poor academic preparation of many students
  - Erosion of male enrollments in higher education
  - Racial and socioeconomic inequities among school districts
  - Long-term exacerbation of financial challenges faced by students
  - Erosion of public confidence in higher education
- Changing academic needs of freshman students affected
  - In high school
  - In grades 5-8
  - In grades K-4

- We have some data
  - SP20
  - Existing studies of the effects of
    - Absenteeism
    - Summer knowledge loss
    - Nutritional deficiencies and poverty
  - Declining enrollments in K-3 grades in public schools

  - 2032
